November Duties for Seniors!

Students should be contacting the colleges they plan on applying to and finding out exactly what forms they will be needing to apply for financial aid. All colleges will ask that you complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid.

(FAFSA). Some colleges will also ask for the CSS/ Financial Aid profile form and/or their own institutional financial aid application. Ask the counseling office or the college financial aid office for the forms.

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MONEY FOR COLLEGE

Federal student loans offer low fixed interest rates; income-based repayment plans; loan forgiveness; and deferment options, including deferment of loan payments when a student returns to school. Generally repayment of a federal loan does not begin until after the student

leaves school. And did you know that a student receiving a federal loan does not need a credit history or a cosigner? Private loans from banks often do not offer such benefits. So if you need to borrow money to pay for college or trade school, start with federal stu-

dent loans.

College Preparation Checklist

- Encourage your parent(s) to complete income tax forms early. If your parent(s) have not completed their tax forms, you can provide estimated information on your federal student aid application, but remember to make any necessary changes later.
- As soon after Jan. 1 as possible, complete and submit your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) along with any other financial aid applications your school (s) of your choice may require. You can complete the FAFSA online at www.fafsa.ed.gov or on paper, but completing the application online is faster and easier. You should submit your FAFSA by the earliest financial aid deadline of the school to which you are applying, usually by early February.
- If you have questions about the federal student aid programs or need assistance with the application process, call 1-800-4-FED-AID (1-800-433-3243).
- After you submit the FAFSA, you should receive your Student Aid Report (SAR) within three days to three
 weeks. Quickly make any necessary corrections and submit them to the FAFSA processor.

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C.A.M.P. @ ASU

The College Assistance Migrant Program (C.A.M.P.) at ASU is a program federally funded by the U.S. Department of Education, Office of Migrant Education.

The program's goal is to provide academic, social and financial support services to migrant and seasonal farmworkers or their dependents; to assist them in the successful completion of their first year of college; and to develop a persistence toward degree attainment.

C.A.M.P. @ ASU provides services and resources in the areas of academic guidance, career planning and development, intellectual and cultural enrichment, as well as financial assistance based on individual need. C.A.M.P. participants also receive follow-up services after successful completion of their first year.

To be eligible to participate in C.A.M.P. @ ASU, the student or at least one parent must be a seasonal or migrant farm worker. A "seasonal farmworker" is a person who, currently or within the past 24 months, was employed for at least 75 days in farm-work and whose primary employment was in farm-work on a temporary or seasonal basic (i.e. not a constant year-round activity). A "migrant farmworker" is a seasonal farm worker whose employment requires travel that prevents him or her from returning to his or her home within the same day. Students may also be eligible if they are participated in a Chapter 1 Migrant Education Program or the National Farmworker Jobs Program (NFJP).

Additionally, students must have a high school diploma or GED, be a U.S. citizen or permanent resident, be FAFSA Pell eligible and have been accepted to Adams State University.

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Mason's Scholarship

The Colorado Mason's Benevolent Scholarship/Grant Programs are open to all graduating seniors in public high schools in the state of Colorado who have been accepted to, and will attend a Colorado institution of higher learning. There is no advantage given to any race, creed, sex, national origin, or Masonic relationship. The Mason's Scholarship is worth \$7,000 per year, renewable annually for up to four years. The Vocational Grant is a one-time award of \$3,000 intended to assist student in obtaining a vocational skill from a vocational training program within the state of Colorado. Automatic Scholarships

Award amounts range from \$1,000 to \$8,000 per academic year and the scholarships are renewable for up to three additional years. To receive the \$1,000 scholarship, students must meet two of the following criteria: 3.2 cumulative GPA, 22 ACT, or be in the top 20 percent in their class. These scholarships cannot be combined with other institutional scholarships, with the exception of the First Generation Scholarship, which is an automatic \$1,000 scholarship for First Generation college students with at least a 3.0 GPA.

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Dennis Kay Memorial Scholarship 4 Year Agriculture

This four year, \$6,000 scholarship will be dispersed (to the student and at the end of each semester) as follows: \$500 per semester for years one and two. \$1,000 per semester for years three and four. Major must remain "AG Related" to qualify.

The four year scholarship will be renewed at the end of each semester upon proof of fulltime attendance and adequate grades. Student must have an accumulative 2.5 GPA for the fist year and 2.75 for the following three years. With the exception of the summer session, the student must be enrolled in college full time and in consecutive semesters.

Mike Kelley Memorial Scholarship

This \$1,000 scholarship is dispersed (to the student and at the end of each semester) as follows: \$500 per semester pending submission of the previous semester's grades. A minimum GPA of 2.5 is required.

SCHOLARSHIP PRE-REQUISITES:

- ◆ The applicant or an immediate family member must be a member of the Monte Vista Coop.
- Regardless of age, the applicant must be a high school graduate, have a GED or be a graduating senior, contingent upon graduation.
- A transcript of current grades is required.
- Applications must be received at the Monte Vista Co-op on or before January 31st, 2015.
- ♦ An "in-person" interview is required, pending completed scholarship. No phone interviews.
